
"I've had more encounters with Jesus on the streets than in church"


Can it be true?

We see it all the time and it can be anything from a truly "wow" moment, to a "God of small things", moment. I want to share one

such God of small things encounter.

At 2 am we were looking after an unconscious youngster whose drink had been spiked. Some of the team stayed with him until an ambulance could attend. We had covered him with our large winter coats.

LEGACY FUND UPDATE



The Legacy fund is the church's tithe (10%) that came from the building project in 2019. As part of this, the PCC delegated responsibility to the youth group for researching and recommending a charities to support up to the amount of $\pounds 2000$.

HERE IS AN UPDATE FROM THE YOUTH GROUP AND RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE PCC

So far, we have decided to donate £1000 of this to Family Link Myanmar. Since 2021, Myanmar has faced a coup, which has made life in extremely difficult. Myanmar Family Link Myanmar is a small UK charity that aims to support communities in Myanmar including establishing a home for 50 formerly homeless children, building wells, running holiday camps for local children, sharing sacks of rice with people in nearby villages, helping to cover medical needs, buying glasses, general clothing and school uniforms and books. Family Link Myanmar also runs 4-day bible conferences for adults, where they can meet other Christians and have some fun together. In the past they have done equivalent camps for children, but this was stopped due to the coup.

Since the money was given, they have taken in 5 new children and given the kids some special treats like extra meat and fish, fruit, orange squash and sweets, run a Christmas lunch of rice for 400 starving people, and there is a plan to build another well in the coming months.

Practical support for All Nations



Role playing as beggars, customs, taxi driver, bureau de change....and more

Three times a year All Nations Christian College run a 'Simulation Exercise' designed to help prepare students for working abroad in less structured countries. A number of men from the MADD group have been helping with the exercise for several years. During the course of the morning the students experience challenging situations which they have to overcome as a group in order to progress in the exercise.

The MADD members perform different roles hoping to make the situation as realistic as possible. It helps the reality of the situation if students are dealing with people they do not know, rather than members of All Nations staff.

Some quotes from some grateful former En-Route course students:

A Danish couple had been very affected by one particular section of the simulation. They remarked during the simulation debriefing that the exercise had **"shaken us very much".**

On going to their country they had been separated at customs (like in the simulation). They reported that because of their experience at All Nations

"we were able to keep calm and not panic and the process went much faster".

A female former student serving in South Africa was car-jacked at gun point. She testified that her experience

"taking part in the security training and simulation had prepared me to stay calm and I felt much calmer afterwards too".

No thespian talent or experience is required to volunteer to "be an actor" for supporting the simulation exercise. We are, in essence, supporting the mission of All Nations which is one of our Mission Partners. It is enjoyable and provides the opportunity to work with staff & students at All Nations. At the end of the morning, students and role players enjoy a lunch together and part as friends! Remembering Tom Paget by Bob Hunt ex-All Nations Vice Principal

In July 1964 All Nations Missionary College moved from Taplow, Bucks to nearby Easneye Mansion. In that same summer the College's gardener Tom Paget joined Christchurch Ware.


Thus began 26 years of stalwart service by the Paget family to our church. Both Tom and Marion served on the PCC at varying times. Tom was also an occasional preacher. But his real gifting was in one-to-one conversations. His Yorkshire bluntness allied to his easy-going nature made him a natural for engaging folk in discussions about spiritual things. In particular he headed up Christchurch's "Evangelism Explosion" team. This strategy made use of small teams visiting parents who had asked for their infant to be baptised leading naturally onto a discussion about their own need of Christ. He then taught a team to do the same.

After retiring from All Nations in 1990, Tom & Marion took on the role of pastoring Anstey Chapel, near Buntingford, for six years. In 1996 he retired again and returned to his native Yorkshire where he died, aged 98, in March, 2024.

One of Tom's famous sayings about the life of mission was -"The most important thing is to bloom where you are planted" Thomas William Paget
